## Budget Plans for 2014 and 2015 - Your Assistance Requested!

As the year draws to a close, we are facing a shortfall for our church's finances. This fall, the amount we ordinarily receive in pledges has not rebounded from the usual summer slump. At the end of November, our income was off by 8 percent. All the committee chairs have kept a close eye on our expenses and we have not overspent what we have received. However, we have not completed all our commitments to the mission projects of the church, including the Presbytery of Northern Kansas. The Finance and Stewardship Committee encourages each of us to complete our pledges for the year.

Looking forward to 2015, we have not yet heard from everyone who supported the church with a pledge in this current year. Once we have received all our pledges, we will be able to prepare our budget for the coming year. At the moment, however, it looks like there will be a decrease in the amount we have available for our ministry, facilities and mission. If you have not made a pledge yet, please prayerfully consider doing so. A narrative budget which projects our anticipated expenses is available in the narthex, and pledge card can be found in the pew in the sanctuary.

## New Church Treasurer and New Finance and Stewardship Committee Chair

**Amber Luckie** has volunteered to serve as the church's treasurer, beginning January 1. Amber, who joined FPC five years ago, works as a loan officer in one of our local commercial banks. She will work closely with Debbie Miller who continues to serve as our Financial Administrator. **Carol Smith** has agreed to become the chair of the Finance and Stewardship committee.

## **With Blessings We Bid Farewell**

This December we said “farewell” and “thank you” to some of our church’s leaders as they moved to new homes. Dr. Lorraine Haricombe has served as an elder and member of the Mission and Witness committee. Her work as the Dean of the Libraries at Kansas University was so well respected that the University named the exhibition gallery at the Watkins Library the “Haricombe Gallery.” Lorraine has accepted a position as Vice-Provost at the University of Texas, and while we will miss her in our congregation’s life we wish her God’s blessing in her new position.

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## **KU Libraries announces naming gift for departing Dean Lorraine Haricombe**

KU Libraries recently announced the naming of the “Haricombe Gallery” in recognition of the nearly eight years of leadership by Dean Lorraine J. Haricombe, who will depart KU in mid-December for a new position as vice provost and director of the University of Texas Libraries.

The Haricombe Gallery in Watson Library is home to the KU Libraries exhibition program. The program, created under Haricombe’s guidance, promotes the creative scholarship of the KU campus community and highlights the benefits of interdisciplinary collaboration.

The naming was made possible by a consortium of donors, who contributed gifts in honor of Haricombe.

“In the past eight years, we have seen significant growth within the libraries’ fundraising efforts as a result of Dean Haricombe’s leadership,” said Gerald Lillian, chair of the KU Libraries Board of Advocates, a group of more than 30 friends and benefactors who work with the dean to ensure the libraries have the fiscal resources needed to support this campus.

“These efforts, which have secured numerous enhancements and achievements for campus, are the direct result of the meaningful relationships Dean Haricombe has built with our most important constituents - alumni, donors and leaders across campus, as well as the thousands of faculty, staff and students who rely on the resources and services offered by KU Libraries,” said Lillian. “Now, in recognition of Dean Haricombe’s service to KU, these constituents have come together in a remarkable show of support.”

“I was deeply touched and humbled by the announcement of the Haricombe Gallery,” said Haricombe. “I have had so many joyous moments in the gallery, a space that serves as the intellectual commons and as social gathering space at KU. To say that I was surprised by the announcement is an understatement; I was wholly overwhelmed by the naming of the gallery in my honor.”

## Reasons to Celebrate the PCUSA in the New Year

### A Message from the Moderator

1. In spite of our denomination losing members, we are dynamic and alive. We had 72,000 new members join the PC(USA). And that is at a time when being part of the institutional church is no longer the “thing to do” as it once was in our society. These 72,000 people joined us because they wanted to be part of our community of witness and faith. That is a church that is becoming revitalized.

2. I am grateful that so many younger adults are returning to our churches and stating that it is a “safe place” for them to learn and grow in a faith that is not judgmental nor self-centered. Many of these young adults are participating regularly but not choosing to join. I hope they will choose to do so one day. But they are with us in worship and service, in education, and in fellowship. And for that I am grateful that our denomination tells them they are welcome in Jesus’ Church—members or not. Likewise, I celebrate with our new 1001 Worshipping Communities that more than 50 percent of these new communities are comprised of diverse congregations—much more reflective of our nation than we have seen in the past.

3. We have an extraordinary outreach in both New York City at the United Nations and our national office in Washington, D.C. In both places our denominational offices are viewed with great respect, and in both cases serve as models for other Christian communities of faith to follow when it comes to spreading the mission of Christ throughout the world—and specifically as it relates to the United States government and the nations that comprise the United Nations General Assembly. As PC(USA) members, we have a collective voice that makes a difference in carrying out Jesus’ directives to us as his followers and we take seriously our belief that Jesus calls us to be peacemakers.

4. Our 10 theological seminaries, as well as Auburn Theological Seminary and the Evangelical Seminary of Puerto Rico, continue to be some of the most outstanding training grounds for ministry and theological scholarship in the world. Each of them is continuing to define a niche that reflects its critical role in service to the church.

5. I am glad we are a church that allows us to disagree, and am grateful that many who may feel that things could work better realize we are a denomination that prides itself on the fact that we aren’t just reformed, but are reformING! Let us join together as one family and, even in our disagreements, find our common bonds. Let us celebrate our “oneness” while affirming our differences, and realize that each of us is created in God’s image. Offering solutions along with criticisms is another gift of Presbyterians.

## Bread for the World—Update

Yes! There has been progress in reducing hunger in the world! Despite gridlocks in Congress and economic downturns in many other countries, reforming U.S. Food Aid (BFW's Offering of Letters 2014 campaign) has been addressed through several initiatives.

1. The farm bill authorized \$80 million for purchase of food closer to the place of need.
2. The 2014 omnibus bill provided \$35 million in cash to reduce the need to monetize commodities (sale of commodities overseas to fund development activities).
3. The House approved an amendment to the 2015 Agricultural Appropriations Bill that provided millions of dollars to implement local and regional procurement of food.
4. The bipartisan Food for Peace Reform Act was introduced in the Senate, the first time a food-aid reform bill has been introduced there.



We remember the advocacy and steadfast commitment of Sarah Casad and we join with family and friends in sharing an appreciation of her life as we worked with her in addressing the needs of poor and hungry people.

## JUST Food - The Douglas County Food Bank



As part of our local mission giving, FPC has been collecting non-perishable food items which are then distributed to families in need in our community. We now have cloth bags with our church name and logo for members to take and fill with their donations of food items. These bags are available on a rack in the narthex. They can be filled and then placed in the JUST Food barrels also located in the narthex. After the third Sunday of each month the food will be taken to the food bank at 11th and Haskell. All food collected by JUST Food remains in Douglas County. The need is great and we can help! The “bag system” has worked well at Corpus Christi and Plymouth Congregational Church and we wanted to give it a try here.

This month we are especially in need of canned fruit (in water) and boxed cereal. Pick up your bag to fill next time you are at church!



## **FPC EcoTeam News**

**EcoTeam Awarded KU Monarch Watch Grant** - Word was received that FPC will receive a free flat of milkweed plugs (32 of them) from the KU Monarch Watch. Funding for the plants was provided to Monarch Watch by the Natural Resource Defense Council. The plants will be planted in the garden plot at the southeast side of the church building. The placement of the plugs will be late April or early May. Once we are finished, we hope to have a Blessing/Dedication of the garden. As stated in our grant application, we want this garden to exhibit FPC's commitment to providing habitat to butterflies and other pollinators. Our hope is that the FPC preschool will be involved and be able to learn first hand about the cycle of the butterfly lifespan as can all members of the congregation who are invited to join with others in the planting of the garden.

**Blue Bird Nesting Boxes** - The EcoTeam will be distributing nesting boxes to interested persons at the first part of the year (date TBA) along with education on placement/maintenance of the boxes.

### **EcoTeam Sponsors Earth Care/Climate Change Advocacy-Action Meeting in December**

We sponsored, along with other earth care groups and faith community green teams of LET-US (Lawrence Ecology Teams United in Sustainability), a meeting for connecting individuals interested in advocating for a particular concern. The areas included: Food/Habitat Restoration, Transportation, Coalition Organizing for Political Action, Education/Writing, Arts/Education, Green Team Development (Faith Communities and Others). This was related to previous gatherings that began with the South Park event for Solidarity with the September NYC Climate Change March in support for UN action on climate change, followed by several Climate Talks. As several individuals expressed, "It is time to advocate, as well as educate."

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## FPC Spirit, Health and Wholeness

HAPPY NEW YEAR! Is 2015 going to mean a fresh start for you? Do you need a quick way to help those in our community? Volunteer to be a blood donor. It's painless!

January is *National Blood Donor Month*. According to the American Association of Blood Banks, blood is traditionally in short supply during the winter months due to the holidays, travel schedules, inclement weather and illness. January, in particular, is a difficult month for blood centers to collect blood donations. Every day in our country, approximately 39,000 units of blood are required in hospitals and emergency treatment facilities for patients with cancer or other diseases, organ transplant recipients and accident victims.

Don't let the cold stop you from warming someone's heart.



If you are at least 17 years of age, weigh at least 110 pounds and meet other donor requirements, **YOU ARE ELIGIBLE**. Consider donating today. The actual blood donation typically takes less than 10-12 minutes. The entire process, from the time one arrives to the time the donor leaves, takes about an hour. What a difference that one-hour can make and may save a life.

### **MEDICINE CABINET CLEAN OUT: TIME TO KEEP IT SAFE!**

When you make your cleaning list, don't forget to include your medicine cabinet. It is important to properly dispose of unused or expired medicine. Disposing of old medications reduces the risk of unintentional use, overdose and illegal abuse.

Follow the disposal instructions on the patient information that comes with your medicine. If you don't have this information, follow these tips:

- Take the medicine out of its original container. Scratch off any personal information on the label.
- Mix the medicine with something that masks the medicine, like kitty litter or used coffee grounds.
- Put the mixture in a container or a plastic bag and place it in your trash.
- **Do not flush prescription drugs down the toilet** unless the disposal directions on the label specifically instruct you to do so.

When in doubt about safe disposal, talk to your pharmacist.
