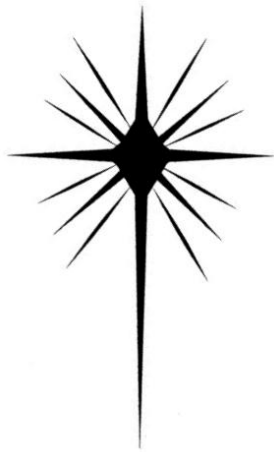

With sadness we announce the retirement of Tracy and Hollie Resseguie from their positions as Director of Music and Children's Choir Director for First Presbyterian Church. The following is a letter that Tracy presented to the Session and asked for it to be shared with the congregation:

I want to say how much I have enjoyed, loved, appreciated, and cherished, being the Director of Music here at First Presbyterian Church. After recently having moved to Kansas City I feel that it is time to say goodbye to my 30 plus years of church work and therefore I have made the decision to retire. I wanted to give the church plenty of time to search and find a suitable replacement. My last Sunday will be April 10, 2016.

I will take with me all the rich experiences and wonderful people that I have encountered during my long tenure here at FPC Lawrence. This decision was not an easy one and I have struggled with it for a long time. My first job working for the church was First Presbyterian Church in Wichita, Kansas in 1982. I have had the privilege to work with so many wonderful pastors and parishioners over the years which has truly blessed my life. My time here at FPC Lawrence has been so wonderful that I communicated with Pastor Kent that I wanted it to be my last call, that is why I have made the decision to retire. I have no plans in seeking another church for employment. There has been lots of thought and prayer that has gone into this decision and again, not an easy one.

I have so many thanks to give the people of this church for so many things, raising my kids in this church and having so many involved in the process that also enriched my children's lives is quite meaningful to me. My hope over the next several months will be trying to say goodbye and thanking everyone that has been such a big part of my life and my family's life.

The Choir has been and is an extension of my family. The members that we have lost over the last 16 years still bothers me today. I have found that the hardest part about church work over education is that people don't graduate out of your choir, if you are there for an extended length of time you lose them just like family members. I have learned so much from so many and will carry this experience with me over the course of my life.

Thank you to the Session for allowing me to be apart of it. It was the one thing that I thought would not be attainable but when Larry Schlosser called me I teared up and was so proud to serve such a long respected church and sharing in it's leadership was simply humbling.

Thank you for this wonderful opportunity, I never took it for granted and have cherished each moment. My prayers will continue for the impact and life of this church moving forward and a part of me will always be here, in the music that has been made, in this space, for years to come.

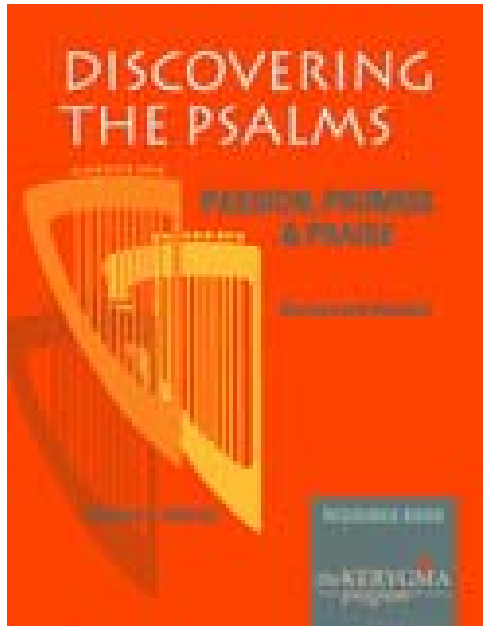

HAPPY NEW YEAR! Is 2016 going to mean a fresh start for you? Do you need a quick way to help those in our community? Volunteer to be a blood donor. It's painless!

Since 1970 January has been declared **National Volunteer Blood Donor Month**, and with good reason. Above all other times of the year, it's the month that presents the most challenges in recruiting people to give blood. This January is no exception with the local Red Cross in an urgent need for more donors.

Changing weather, busy holiday schedules, increased cold and flu symptoms and even the winter blues can keep the most dedicated blood donors from making or keeping an appointment to give. Yet winter weather can lead to more traumatic injuries on icy roads and may increase the need for blood.

Every two seconds someone in America needs blood, and approximately 40,000 units of red blood are needed every day. Donating blood is a safe, life-saving and selfless gift that enhances the level of preparedness for each and every community in this nation.

If you are at least 17 years of age, weigh at least 110 pounds and meet other donor requirements, **YOU ARE ELIGIBLE**. Consider donating today. The actual blood donation typically takes less than 10-12 minutes. The entire process, from the time one arrives to the time the donor leaves, takes about an hour. What a difference that one-hour can make and could save a life.

Soothing a Sore Throat: What To Do When Your Throat Hurts

We've all had sore throats around this time of year. Your throat feels scratchy and may hurt when you swallow. What can you do to soothe a sore throat? And when is it a sign of a more serious infection?

Most sore throats are caused by viral infections such as the common cold or the flu. These throat problems are generally minor and go away on their own. To soothe your irritated throat, keep it moist. "Ever notice that a sore throat seems worse in the morning? It's because your throat gets so dry overnight," says Dr. Valerie Riddle, an infectious disease expert at NIH. "Having lozenges or hard candies—or anything that stimulates saliva production—will keep your throat moist. It's also important to drink plenty of fluids." For young children who might choke on hard candies or lozenges, try cold liquids and popsicles. Throat pain might also be soothed by throat sprays and over-the-counter pain relievers such as acetaminophen, ibuprofen or aspirin, but don't give aspirin to young children.

Contact a doctor if your sore throat is severe, doesn't feel better after a few days, or is accompanied by a high fever or swollen glands. These symptoms could be signs of a bacterial infection, such as strep throat. Taking antibiotics won't help at all if your sore throat is caused by viruses, but they're essential for fighting bacterial infections like strep.

Strep is the most common bacterial throat infection. Although it can occur in adults, strep throat is more common in children between ages 5 and 15. "If your child has severe throat pain, a fever above 100.4 degrees, or swollen glands, you should get medical attention right away," advises Riddle. Children with strep also may experience nausea, vomiting and stomach pain.

To see whether you have strep throat, the doctor will take a throat swab. If test results confirm

strep, your doctor will prescribe antibiotics. After 24 hours of taking them, you should no longer be contagious. You'll likely begin feeling better within a couple of days, but to fully recover it's important to finish all of the medicine. Strep is highly contagious. Treat it quickly to prevent it from spreading to others.

The best way to protect yourself from the germs that cause these infections is to wash your hands often. Try to steer clear of people who have colds or other contagious infections. And avoid smoking and inhaling second-hand smoke, which can irritate your throat.

Sore Throat Relief

- Try hot tea with lemon or some hot soup.
 - Keep your throat moist with lozenges or hard candies.
 - Gargle with warm salt water or use ice chips.
 - Cold liquids or popsicles can numb the pain. Throat sprays and over-the-counter pain relievers can help, too.
 - Use a humidifier or vaporizer, especially when sleeping, to keep air from getting too dry.
- If the sore throat persists for several days, contact a health care professional.

TIME TO CLEAN OUT YOUR MEDICINE CABINET?

When you make your cleaning list, don't forget to include your medicine cabinet. It is important to properly dispose of unused or expired medicine. Disposing of old medications reduces the risk of unintentional use, overdose and illegal abuse.

Follow the disposal instructions on the patient information that comes with your medicine. If you don't have this information, follow these tips:

- Take the medicine out of its original container. Scratch off any personal information on the label.
- Mix the medicine with something that masks the medicine, like kitty litter or used coffee grounds.
- Put the mixture in a container or a plastic bag and place it in your trash.
- **Do not flush prescription drugs down the toilet** unless the disposal directions on the label specifically instruct you to do so.
- When in doubt about safe disposal, talk to your pharmacist.

Speaking of medicine, did you know the Parish Nurse Ministry has first aid kits in the Church? The purpose of the first aid kit is to have supplies available to treat minor problems. These kits are located in the Kitchen, the Welcome Center cabinet and in the main office supply room. We hope you don't need to use these, but wanted everyone to know they are available.

Just a reminder that the Parish Nurse program always accepts good condition durable medical equipment for us to loan!
