The Session has called for our annual congregational meeting to take place following the 11:00 worship service on February 8. As part of that meeting's agenda, we will review our financial reports from 2014 and the budget for 2015. In preparation for that meeting, allow me to give a brief overview of our church's finances.

FPC ended 2014 with a slight deficit of about \$15,000. All our program committees spent less than their budgets. At the same time, we did not reach our expected goals for revenue, falling short by about 1.5 per cent. As a result, we were not able to complete all of our mission giving to worthy causes in the Lawrence community.

As of this writing, we have not approved a budget for the coming year. We have not heard from everyone who has pledged to support our congregation's ministry in the past, and so we are still far short of our hoped-for revenues. At the Finance committee meeting in early January, we cut about \$47,000 out of the 2015 budget, taking small amounts from our program ministries (worship, education and fellowship) and larger cuts in other areas (Trustees, mission and personnel). Even with these cuts, we are still facing a projected deficit for the coming year.

Please keep our church officers and the members of the Finance committee in your prayers as we try to find ways to maintain the level of ministry to which we are accustomed at the church. There is much work to do in the weeks ahead. Your support for our shared ministry has been and will continue to be appreciated.

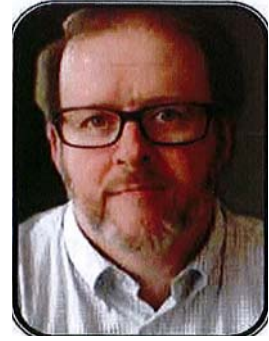

## **Theologian in Residence 2015**

“How do we create theology in an increasingly diverse and pluralistic culture?” This is one of the questions that Dr. Molly T. Marshall will be addressing as a part of this year’s Theologian in Residence program, “Living Religiously in a Plural Culture,” February 22-24, 2015.

Dr. Marshall will be speaking at the following times:

- On Sunday at 7:00 pm, at the Islamic Center of Lawrence, 1917 Naismith Drive;
- Monday At the Dole Center at 9:30,am and in a KU classroom, at 1100 am;
- On Tuesday evening, at the Ecumenical Campus Ministry, at 7:00.

There will also be an informal wine and cheese reception at Genovese restaurant on Mass Street, on Monday between 3 and 5 pm.

A product of cooperation of over a dozen faith communities and the Religious Studies Department of the University of Kansas, the Theologian in Residence program has since 2001 brought renown theologians to northeast Kansas and is pleased to welcome Dr. Marshall as its 2015 speaker.

Dr. Marshall is the president of Central Baptist Theological Seminary, and has completed degrees and graduate work at several diverse institutions, including the Tantur Ecumenical Institute in Jerusalem; Cambridge University; Princeton Theological Seminary; The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary; and Oklahoma Baptist University. She emerges from this diverse spiritual and academic background with a passion for ecumenical work and a profound understanding of the ways that we engage in the making of faith and theology in our diverse culture. Dr. Marshall has authored three books: *No Salvation Outside the Church?*, *What it Means to Be Human*, and *Joining the Dance: a Theology of the Spirit*.

Join us as Dr. Marshall presents on – and invites our participation in – the practice of shared theology-making.

# News from the Eco Team at FPC



## IT IS "OFFICIAL" - FPC IS RECOGNIZED AS AN EARTH CARE CONGREGATION OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH (USA)

I hope many of you reading this will join with the EcoTeam after worship, February 1, 12:15 p.m. in the FPC Library to celebrate our faith community being recognized as part of a national network of Presbyterian churches who are recognized as Earth Care Congregations. Please come and learn how such a designation is determined and what it might mean for FPC. We will also be taking suggestions as to how we might follow through on the Earth Care Pledge affirmed by the FPC Session on behalf of the congregation. Copies of the pledge will be available.

## EARTH CARE FORUMS

By the time you receive this newsletter, we will have had four Earth Care Forums. The last two will be as follows: Feb. 1 - An EcoJustice Question: What Would the Construction of the Keystone Pipeline Have to do with Kansas Interfaith Power and Light? (KIPL and FPC are in covenant with each other.); Feb. 8 - What Does It Mean for FPC to be a Certified Earth Care Congregation of the Presbyterian Church? (We will include the suggestions made at our celebration the week before and invite additional ones.) All Forums will be in the Fireside Room from 9:40 - 10:40 a.m.

The Forums have been well attended and have included "public visitors" which have been warmly welcomed. Their comments and questions have been insightful.

## BUTTERFLIES AND BLUE BIRDS

The FPC Butterfly Garden will be needing the attention of volunteers to plant and maintain. We hope to plant the milkweed in the spring. The "plugs" were made possible by a KU Monarch Watch Grant. Also, in the spring, Blue Bird nesting boxes will be placed on the church grounds. Education on the maintenance and needed habitat will be shared with those who are interested in possibly having a nesting box in their yard.

## LAWRENCE ECOLOGY TEAMS UNITED IN SUSTAINABILITY

LET-US, the interfaith network of faith community green teams continues to sponsor a reading group of twelve persons from FPC, Trinity Episcopal, Lawrence Unitarian Fellowship, and Plymouth Congregational. FPC EcoTeam members Lori Hutfles, Sven Alstrom and Thad Holcombe participate, with Thad as the Facilitator. The book now being discussed is *"Ecology and Religion"* by John Grim and Mary Evelyn Tucker. The authors are founders of the Forum on

Religion and Ecology at Yale University.

LET-US is the sponsor of another meeting to focus on organizing local/regional advocacy regarding the following: transportation, food, and climate change. It will be Sunday, January 25. 7:00 - 8:30 p.m. at the Jewish Community Center. #### You Can Help the EcoTeam and the Butterfly Garden

The EcoTeam has the plot ready to plant when spring weather permits on the south east corner of the church. If you have plants that are host or nectar plants for butterflies, please consider sharing them with the new garden.

Nectar plants are such plants as coneflowers, some asters, goldenrod, daises, zinnias, pentas, and verbena bonariensis.

Host plants include some of the above and hollyhocks, parsley, rue, and snapdragons. This is not a complete list but are plants that you might have in your garden. We will be getting several kinds of milkweed plants from Monarch Watch in May. This is a small garden thus all space will be used for nectar and host plants. The one exception will be planting liriop plants along the outer edge of the garden to stabilize the soil. If you have liriop, please share. Other items that you may have extra in your tool shed and will be needed for the garden would be a hose, plant identification stakes, a presentable rain barrel and many 6" plastic pots with bottom removed to deter those plant eating rabbits. We are excited about having a butterfly garden on the church grounds. This small corner garden is to be an example of a butterfly garden to be enjoyed and perhaps encourage others to help save the butterflies.





## FPC Spirit, Health and Wholeness

HAPPY HEART MONTH!!!! Even though we think of Valentine's Day in February, we hope you will not forget that it is also **American Heart Month**.



Heart disease is the leading cause of death for men and women in the United States. Every year, 1 in 4 deaths are caused by heart disease. The good news? Heart disease can often be prevented when people make healthy choices and manage their health conditions. Communities, health professionals, and families can work together to create opportunities for people to make healthier choices. On Friday, February 6, 2015, Americans nationwide will wear red to show their support for women's heart disease awareness on National Wear Red Day<sup>®</sup>. This observance promotes the Red Dress symbol and provides an opportunity for everyone to unite in this life-saving awareness movement by showing off a favorite red dress, shirt, or tie, or Red Dress pin.

“Heart Disease Doesn't Care What You Wear—it's the #1 Killer of Women.” The campaign warns women about heart disease and provides tools to help them take action against its risk factors. Its message is paired with an arresting visual—the Red Dress—that serves as the national symbol for women and heart disease awareness. The Parish Nurses Ministry would love to see a “sea of RED” on Sunday February 8<sup>th</sup> in support of this movement.

### TEN COMMANDMENTS FOR A HEALTHY HEART

1. Know your risk factors for heart disease.
2. Talk to your doctor about reducing your risk of heart disease.
3. Have your blood pressure checked regularly.
4. Know your cholesterol numbers. (These include total cholesterol, HDL or "good" cholesterol, LDL or "bad" cholesterol, and triglycerides.)
5. Have your blood sugar level checked for diabetes.
6. Do not smoke cigarettes or use other tobacco products.
7. Eat for your heart health.
8. Get regular physical activity. (At least 30 minutes of moderate physical activity on most or all days of the week.)
9. Aim for a healthy weight.
10. Know the signs and symptoms of a heart attack and the importance of seeking medical help immediately.

### February 14 is National Donor Day -- a day to give the gift of life.



National Donor Day celebrated each year on February 14th highlights ways people can save lives through blood, bone marrow, organ, eye and tissue donations.

- Fill out an organ and tissue donation card, register with your State Donor Registry (Midwest Transplant Network, 1-888-744-4531, [www.mwtn.org](http://www.mwtn.org)) and make sure your family knows you want to be a donor.
- Join the National Registry of potential volunteer marrow and blood stem cell donors.
- Learn how you can donate your baby's umbilical cord blood stem cells at birth.
- Donate blood.

**Why be a Donor?** The need is great and growing.

- Almost 95,000 people are in need of an organ for transplant.
  - Approximately 35,000 children and adults in our country have life-threatening blood diseases that could be treated by a marrow/blood stem cell or cord blood transplant.
- Every two seconds someone in America needs blood, more than 39,000 units each day, according to the American Red Cross.

**Why do it Today?** Valentine's Day is the day of love and donation is the gift of life. Can you think of a more loving gesture than making February 14 the day you join thousands of Americans in making the donation decision?

February is also **National Children's Dental Health Month**. Each February, the American Dental Association (ADA) sponsors National Children's Dental Health Month to raise awareness about the importance of oral health. Developing good habits at an early age and scheduling regular dental visits helps children get a good start on a lifetime of healthy teeth and gums. Many parents across the country will issue a common refrain at dinnertime tonight: "You'd better eat that—it's good for you." There is another old favorite in the parental arsenal of dietary admonitions: "Don't eat that—it'll rot your teeth!" Now more than ever, kids are faced with a bewildering array of food choices – from fresh produce to sugar-laden processed convenience meals and snack foods. What children eat and when they eat it may affect not only their general health but also their oral health. **Keep those smiles beautiful!**
