In a recent issue of *The Christian Century*, Sam Wells, Rector of St Martin's-in-the-Fields Church in London, wrote about the challenges facing churches in our modern age when it comes to finding resources for ministry. St. Martin's was one of the churches I visited during my sabbatical last spring. I knew of the church from listening to classical music radio programs, as in, "Sir Neville Mariner, conducting the Academy of St. Martins-in-the-Fields." When I arrived at the church, I was completely unprepared for a fairly plain sanctuary without much room for a three-piece band, let alone an orchestra. (I was also unaware that within the church, there is a Royal box, the pew set aside for the Queen. St. Martins is the home parish for the Queen when she is in residence at Buckingham Palace.)

In his column, Wells said that St. Martin's realized in the 1980's that the church could no longer sustain its ministries based on stewardship alone. The church developed new plans to help maintain the facilities and its ministries. Today, the church has a very popular café, and art gallery and bookstore, along with hundreds of musical programs each year. It still offers worship services in the evening services seven days a week while welcoming 700,000 visitors a year. In addition, the church has a shelter and soup kitchen for the homeless. While the number of visitors to First Presbyterian Church may be somewhat smaller, we do have a very active congregation and a facility that is used by people throughout the Lawrence community. At the same time, we are looking at ways that we can sustain the active ministries of this church into the future.

Over the past two months the officers of this congregation have been wrestling with the budget for the coming year. (You will find a report about the Annual Congregational Meeting in this edition of First Press from John Mitchell, the Clerk to the Session.) In February, our elders, deacons and trustees met for their annual retreat to discuss the critical areas of our church's ministry. Building on our *10 for Twenty* goals we established four years ago, this month we identified two goals in each of these areas:

NEWS FROM THE CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

On February 8 following the 11:00 worship service the Annual Meeting of the Congregation/ Corporation was held. This event provides an opportunity for the congregation to look over the past year in the life of the church.

The meeting began with Pastor Mary reviewing 2014 highlights including the new sanctuary lighting, the improvements made to the parking lot including the new drive-through at the south end of the building, the information technology enhancements that have been installed, the second Annual Organ Concert, growth of the First 5 Years program, the highly successful Vacation Bible School, and achieving certification as an Earth Care Congregation. These highlights bring to mind how much our building is used by both our members as well as the greater Lawrence community. Our church offers so much and there are so many ways to be involved.

During the meeting we also reviewed the slow decline in financial support for the church over the past decade. Unfortunately, unless things improve in 2015, the Session will need to consider cutting some of our existing programs or making reductions in staffing. While nationally we have experienced a significant economic decline during recent years, the economy is now improving and we hope support of our church, its programs, and our wonderful staff will improve as well.

The Session has approved a budget for only the first six months of 2015 and will monitor our financial condition closely. The Session also has identified some new ways to seek the financial support of our members. The Session also is planning an effort to seek input from our members with respect to their concerns and suggestions. You will hear more about these efforts in the coming weeks.

Thank you for your support of FPC, its programs, and our involvement in the community. We are truly blessed!

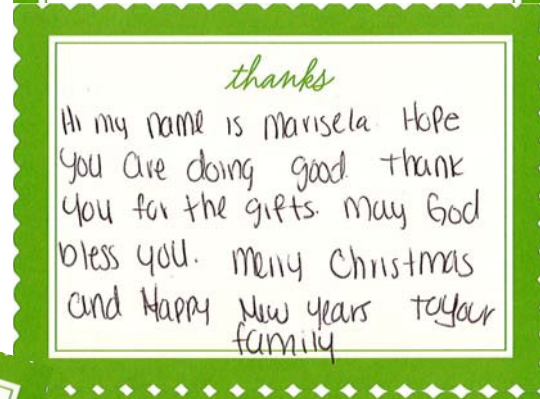
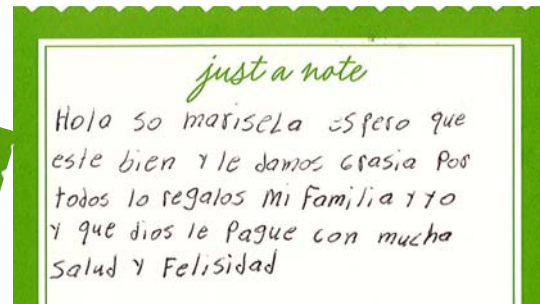


Moderator of the Synod of Mid America

Ecumenical Holy Week Service

Each year, the clergy of Lawrence host a series of services during Holy Week (March 30 – April 3) – a tradition that is over 25 years old. This year’s services will take place at Immanuel Lutheran Church 2104 Bob Billings Parkway (corner of Iowa and Bob Billings), who will be hosting for the first time.

The service begins at 12 noon, and on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday is followed by a simple soup and sandwich lunch. The Monday preacher will be Joanna Harader from Peace Mennonite Church, with Carolynn Winters-Hazelton serving as liturgist. Tuesday will feature Eleanor McCormick, Associate Pastor at Plymouth Congregational Church. Wednesday, Kathy Williams, Associate Pastor at First United Methodist Church will be the preacher, with Kent Winters-Hazelton serving as liturgist. Wednesday will also be the day our Presbyterian Women will be serving the lunch. Thursday, we will be led by Matt Sturtevant from First Baptist Church. On Good Friday, several of our local clergy will participate.

Palm Sunday

Just as the crowds gathered on the streets of Jerusalem waving palm branches and celebrating the triumphant entry of Jesus into the Holy City, we celebrate our Lord with our own triumphant procession on Palm/Passion Sunday, March 29th. All are invited to line-up for our procession of palms in the Narthex to begin each service of worship. First service will gather at 8:15 a.m. , Second service at 10:45 a.m.

For the ninth year in a row, we are using Eco-Palms in our procession.

Eco-Palms are part of a free-trade oriented justice initiative to ensure we remain good stewards of God’s earth and share financial resources fairly. Eco-Palms harvesters have learned about harvesting practices that minimize impact on the natural forest as well as ways to protect wild species of palms.

Justice Matters

Justice Matters is an organization comprising 21 diverse religious congregations in Lawrence, KS. Its mission is to "move Lawrence toward a City of God where justice rolls down like a mighty river", according to Ben MacConnell, its lead organizer. Last October, they held over 100 house-meetings and canvassed Lawrence neighborhoods to determine the first priorities they planned to address. They settled on children concerns, mental health, and affordable housing/homelessness.

On March 8th, The FPC Justice Team (the individuals who hosted house meetings last fall and those who attended and were interested in being involved) will be meeting between services in the Fellowship Hall for a quick update and to plan towards the report from the research teams in April and the Nehemiah Action Assembly in May. If you are interested in learning more, please contact Pastor Mary and she can get you plugged in. Working toward justice in Lawrence is one of the many ways God calls us to build the kingdom.

Quick Updates on the Research:

Housing (Chairs: Rev. Randy Weinkauff and Rev. Matt Sturtevant)

This week, we acquired a description of all the tenant complaints from Lawrence received by the Housing and Credit Counseling, Inc. for 2013 and 2014. We have also filed an open records request on rental/housing complaints received by the city for the same years. We hope to determine the scale to which quality of housing is an issue in Lawrence. We have determined that the lack of transitional housing in Lawrence for particularly vulnerable populations (e.g., women fleeing domestic violence) is a critical problem. We also continue to research the issue of affordability for low-income working families in Lawrence.

Mental Health (Chairs: Rev. Kathy Williams and Rev. John McDermott)

Last week, we received a commitment from County Commissioner Flory to travel with a Justice Matters delegation to see and understand the Bexar County, Texas jail diversion model in April. We extended the same invitation to Commissioner Thellman, and also plan to invite: County Administrator Craig Weinaug, Commissioner Gaughan, Lawrence Police Chief Khatib, Lawrence Memorial Hospital CEO Gene Meyer, Sheriff McGovern, Bert Nash CEO Dave Johnson, Municipal Court Judge Miller, and Journal World reporter, Caitlin Doornbos. We feel it will be important for all of the key stakeholders of our community to understand one of the best models we have in our country to divert the mentally ill into treatment instead of jail. Children (Chairs: Fr. Michael Scully, Barbara Palmer, James Hilliard)

Last week, we spoke with Jane Stephens, founder of acestoohigh.com, who has studied how other cities have used the ACE study to prevent childhood trauma. Later this month, Justice Matters will be sending a group to visit with Dr. Vince Felitti, the original co-author of the ACE study, at the Kansas Action for Children symposium.

Soothing a Sore Throat: What To Do When Your Throat Hurts



We've all had sore throats around this time of year. Your throat feels scratchy and may hurt when you swallow. What can you do to soothe a sore throat? And when is it a sign of a more serious infection?

Most sore throats are caused by viral infections such as the common cold or the flu. These throat problems are generally minor and go away on their own. To soothe your irritated throat, keep it moist. "Ever notice that a sore throat seems worse in the morning? It's because your throat gets so dry overnight," says Dr. Valerie Riddle, an infectious disease expert at NIH. "Having lozenges or hard candies—or anything that stimulates saliva production—will keep your throat moist. It's also important to drink plenty of fluids."

For young children who might choke on hard candies or lozenges, try cold liquids and pop-sicles. Throat pain might also be soothed by throat sprays and over-the-counter pain relievers such as acetaminophen, ibuprofen or aspirin, but don't give aspirin to young children.

Contact a doctor if your sore throat is severe, doesn't feel better after a few days, or is accompanied by a high fever or swollen glands. These symptoms could be signs of a bacterial infection, such as strep throat. Taking antibiotics won't help at all if your sore throat is caused by viruses, but they're essential for fighting bacterial infections like strep.

Strep is the most common bacterial throat infection. Although it can occur in adults, strep throat is more common in children between ages 5 and 15. Riddle says strep can be harder to detect in younger children, because it can cause a runny nose and other symptoms that make it seem like a cold. "If your child has severe throat pain, a fever above 100.4 degrees, or swollen glands, you should get medical attention right away," advises Riddle. Children with strep also may experience nausea, vomiting and stomach pain.

To see whether you have strep throat, the doctor will take a throat swab. If test results confirm strep, your doctor will prescribe antibiotics. After 24 hours of taking them, you should no longer be contagious. You'll likely begin feeling better within a couple of days, but to fully recover it's important to finish all of the medicine.

Strep is highly contagious. Treat it quickly to prevent it from spreading to others. Riddle says, "Not only can the infection be transmitted, but there are potential complications from untreated strep throat." These include ear infections, rheumatic fever and kidney problems.

Another fairly common throat infection is tonsillitis, which occurs when you have sore, swollen tonsils. It's caused by many of the same viruses and bacteria that cause sore throats. If you have frequent bouts of tonsillitis or strep throat, you may need surgery (called a tonsillectomy) to

have your tonsils removed.

The best way to protect yourself from the germs that cause these infections is to wash your hands often. Try to steer clear of people who have colds or other contagious infections. And avoid smoking and inhaling second-hand smoke, which can irritate your throat.

Remember, Blood Pressure Checks will be Sunday, March 1st in the library. We are pleased to provide this service for our Church family. We routinely have over 20 people check their blood pressure the first Sunday of the month. We record our result to keep for your use. If your blood pressure is well controlled it is a good way to keep track, and if you are making any changes in your medications or other treatments, it might be a good way to make sure your blood pressure isn't affected. If you have another health problem, such as diabetes, you may need to check it more often. We hope, in the long run, you may risk fewer complications related to high blood pressure and enjoy a healthier life.
