“Keeping Faith in the Middle East”
Pastor’s sermon series and class
Beginning May 3

Last year at this time, Pastor Kent was traveling in Israel and the Occupied Territories of Palestine as part of his sabbatical leave. One of the goals of his trip was to learn more about the historical and contemporary issues that are part of the long conflict in the Holy Land. This month, through our time in worship and education, he will share some of what he learned with the congregation.

During the first three Sundays of May, he will present sermons on the theme, “Keeping Faith in the Middle East”. He will also be leading an Adult Education class exploring related issues such as the Role of Zionism, the Challenges and Promises of the Two State Solution, and the Hope for Peace in the Land of Jesus’ Birth. This class will take place in the Fireside Room, starting at 9:45.

In preparation for the class, you may want to read one of the books by Father Elias Chacour, *Blood Brothers* (which is available in an eBook format) or *We Belong to the Land*. Fr. Chacour is the (retired) Greek Catholic Archbishop of Nazareth and All Galilee, and an internationally known figure representing Palestinian Christians. His books recount his experience growing up in Palestine at the time the State of Israel came into being, which caused significant disruption to the indigenous Palestinian population. Fr. Chacour met with Pastor Kent’s delegation while he was in Nazareth.

The dynamics of the Holy Land change dramatically and frequently. Some of the conclusions that seemed encouraging last May are not as apparent today, and yet the need for peace and security for the Jews and Palestinians of that troubled land has never been greater. Please join us as we think and pray together for the “peace of Jerusalem.” (Psalm 122)

FPC Building Use

As Holy Week began, the church office staff received a note raising concern about items that seemed to be stored in the chapel on Sunday morning. The concern provides us an opportunity to offer a comment about our building use and the church's annual budget.

As we've noted on several occasions, our church facility is a tremendous resource to the Lawrence community. We estimate that as many as 1,000 people use the building during the week, from 9 in the morning to 9 at night. That includes the Scouting program, 12-step meetings, Preschool and Small World kids and parents, and a variety of organizations that hold meetings and events at FPC. During the school year, the chapel is used every day of the week (as are most of the rooms in the building). The Preschool uses it on Monday, Wednesday and Friday, and Small World on Tuesday and Thursday. Both groups have different set up needs, which also differs from the way we set up the Chapel for Sunday morning. While it is great that we have such use of this remarkable building, our staff is hard pressed to reset all the rooms after every use.

At the Annual meeting in February, the Session presented the 2015 budget that included a \$50,000 decrease. Some of that cut came about when we eliminated the sexton position, which had the primary responsibility of setting up the building each morning for its expected use. Today, we have only Jackson Armbrister available to set up and dismantle rooms on a daily basis – along with his other duties. Given that limitation, we made the conscientious decision to let some of the items used during the week in the chapel to remain there for Sunday morning. When we have a special service in the chapel, such as Good Friday or a small funeral, the space will be appropriately cleared and appointed.

In the meantime, we continue to encourage your gifts to support the church in its work. Your pledge or special offering goes a long way toward FPC's ministry to our community. Your support is gratefully welcomed.

Another way our facilities are shared is this:

At the end of the day for First 5 Years, if the weather is nice, you can find several families gathered around the Peace Pole sharing snacks and news and time with each other. We are so glad to be able to share our space in this way too!

Making Faith Matter **Bread for the World Offering of Letters**

Bread for the World calls upon the support of local congregations to urge Congress in reauthorizing child nutrition programs under the Healthy, Hunger-free Kids Act of 2015. These programs include school breakfast and lunch programs as well as child care programs, summer food programs and WIC (Women, Infants and Children).

On Sundays May 17 and May 24, there will be an opportunity for you to write letters to legislators before and after each worship service. May 24th marks the date for the change over to the summer schedule with one service at 10 am. Preceding that service, at 9 am the adult church school class will be meeting and the focus will be on learning more about child nutrition and also the opportunity for writing letters.

Child nutrition programs are an investment in our future. Legislators must be encouraged to look beyond the figures of a balanced budget and hear from us that taking care of our children's hunger and health is a priority in planning for our future.

In April, Adult Ministry presented classes on Justice Matters, a community wide effort , involving about 20 churches and various community agencies to explore three issues as its focus: mental health, children and affordable housing/homelessness.



Please refer to Pastor Kent’s article in the newsletter for more information about Justice Matters.

Dee Miller presented issues related to Children including the ACES study which is a broad based study on Adverse Childhood Experiences. Their focus considers intergenerational trauma and early childhood development.



Bob Tryanski discussed the mental health working group and explored a need for early intervention among youth with mental illness, the needs and services available, the proposed Douglas County Jail expansion, and the role of police and EMTs as first responders in mental health crisis situations. He had just returned from a site visit in the San Antonio area and highlighted their success over a 15 year period.

Sara Taliaferro will look issues such as housing affordability, poor and inhabitable housing, predatory lease agreements, and a lack of transitional housing in the Lawrence community for families in need.

Beginning May 3rd in the Fireside Room, Pastor Kent will be sharing on "Keeping Faith in the Middle East", a sermon series and adult class discussion looking and the historic and contemporary points of conflict between Israel and the Palestinian population.

Dr. Huyser’s study of the Old Testament continues through May in the chapel.

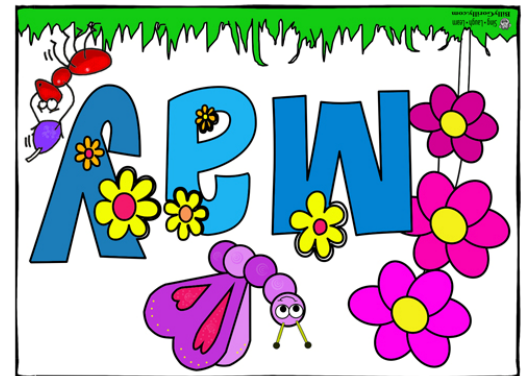
