In the light of news stories about the financial oversight of the social service agency, JUST Foods, I wanted to share with the congregation the steps we have taken at First Presbyterian Church to secure that all the gifts we have received are properly accounted for.

In September 2010, we instituted new procedures for all of our church accounting. We contracted with Church Administrative Professionals, LLC, to process all our income, payroll, disbursement and bookkeeping activities. One of their partners, Debbie Miller, functions as our church Financial Administrator. Debbie is a certified church administrator, with a specialization in church finance and a recognized administrator in the Presbyterian Church. She works with FPC, part-time, on a contract basis. Debbie is not a member of our congregation.

At that same time, we established a Finance and Stewardship committee that meets monthly to provide oversight for our financial administration, to review monthly financial reports, prepare an annual budget for the church, and conduct the annual stewardship campaign. The committee has on average seven members at its meetings. It has been moderated by Jeff Southard, George Norton, and Carol Smith. The Presbyterian *Book of Order* (G-3.0113) requires that the church accounts be reviewed annually. The Finance and Stewardship committee reviews the primary accounts monthly. The committee, through the Treasurer or committee moderator, makes an oral and written report at each meeting of the Session.

We established a process for payment of invoices and reimbursement to church members. Requests for reimbursement must have supporting documentation, and must be signed by a committee chair or one of the pastors. The church Treasurer reviews each request for checks to determine if the proper support material, such as receipts and invoices, are attached.

One of the first actions taken by the committee was to authorize an audit by an outside accountant for the years 2009 and 2010. The conclusion of the audit read, "In our opinion...the financial position of First Presbyterian Church, and its change in its assets and its cash flows for the year then ended, are in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America."

Debbie, as the Financial Administrator, prepares all the checks we process, but is not authorized to sign checks. The church Treasurer, Amber Luckie, signs the checks but cannot prepare any checks. The pastors are not authorized to prepare or sign checks, nor are any other members of the church's program staff.

I hope this review provides you with the assurance that the leadership of this congregation acts appropriately and responsibly in its financial accounting. If you have any questions about how your gifts are being handled, please speak with Debbie Miller, Amber Luckie or Carol Smith.

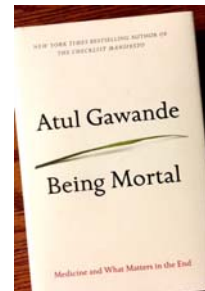

Thank you to everyone who participated in the survey. We received 89 survey responses and during the October meeting the Session discussed the results.

Highlights:

Hunger Update

Bread for the World continues its Washington work advocating for hungry and poor Americans. In Kansas, we are the 14th hungriest state. That's not something to be proud of. Food insecure, not food secure.

- One in 6 household (15.9) struggle to put food on the table compared to 1 in 7 nationwide.
- More than 50.0 percent of Kansas households in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP, formerly food stamps) are working households.
- More than 382,712 people live in poverty (\$24,817 per year for a family of 4), including nearly 1 out of 6 children.

Helpful legislation has included:

- SNAP kept 4.7 people out of poverty.
- The Earned Income Tax Credit and Child Tax Credit kept 10 million people out of poverty.
- School lunches kept 1.3 million children out of poverty.

During this last quarter of 2015, look for legislative action regarding hunger related programs. Rep. Lynn Jenkins is now co-chair of the House Hunger Caucus. She needs to hear from us!

FPC Spirit, Health and Wholeness

November always seems to herald a busy time of year. Thanksgiving, the Christmas season and numerous social obligations find us running daily. It is a great time to remember that this is **National Family Caregivers Month** — a nationally recognized month that seeks to draw attention to the many challenges facing family caregivers and raise awareness about community programs that support family caregivers. Simply put, family caregiving is the act of assisting someone you care about who is chronically ill or disabled and who is no longer able to care for themselves. Family caregiving is the bedrock upon which this country’s healthcare system depends. The services provided by family caregivers represents 80% of all home care services and are conservatively valued at \$306 billion a year, more than twice the amount spent on paid home care and nursing home services combined. Unfortunately, there is nothing simple about family caregiving.

Caregiving in the 21st Century is fundamentally different than it was in the biblical times when the commandment to Honor thy Mother and Father was created. People died at a much younger age and often times without the benefits of medication and the advanced medical technologies we see today. One thing that hasn’t changed however, are the common bonds that tie all family caregivers together. The typical family caregiver is a 46-year-old woman caring for her widowed mother who does not live with her. She is married and employed. Approximately 60% of family caregivers are women. Thirty percent of family caregivers caring for seniors are themselves aged 65 or older. If you know of someone providing caregiving, please take time from your hectic schedule to support their efforts by providing help or just a “break” from caregiving. Let’s be a truly “Caring Congregation”. We all need respite, and caregivers certainly have less than most of us. Reaching out to help would be a wonderful voluntary “gift of love” — maybe you can provide transportation, help with insurance or other paperwork, household support, regular meals. Caregivers...don’t forget that the Parish Nurse Ministry has durable medical equipment to loan.

Talk about the ultimate Caregiver! November is also **National Hospice Month**. Hospice is an interdisciplinary team of health care professionals and trained volunteers dedicated to providing pain management, symptoms control, psychosocial support, and spiritual care to those living with life-limiting illness and their families. If you are so inclined, consider being a hospice volunteer. It may be one of the most rewarding volunteer services that you could perform.

Staying Happy Naturally

Emotional well-being and mood are profoundly influenced by diet and lifestyle. Gratefully, the science supports a host of “therapeutic lifestyle changes” – TLC for short – that can improve your mood and lower your risk of depression. Here’s the complete list based on my most recent scientific review. (Please note these strategies are in no specific order.)

- Be physically active / exercise daily. Any activity counts, but formal exercise and sports appear to be the best. Also, the more vigorous the activity the better.
- Minimize processed and fast foods. Consume mostly whole “nature-made” foods.
- Consume omega 3 rich foods often. These include: oily fish (salmon, sardines, lake trout, herring, cod), omega 3 eggs, walnuts, whole soy foods, hemp/chia/flax seeds, canola oil, oysters, and small leafy greens. Fish oil supplements are also an option for getting in optimal amounts of omega fats, but eating oily fish regularly is likely the very best way.

- Keep your weight in a healthy range
 - Eat an abundance of fruits and vegetables. Those with the most anti-inflammatory oomph are likely the best and include: red onions, tomatoes, Brussels sprouts, red/orange/yellow bell peppers, dark leafy greens, apples, red grapes, berries, cherries, oranges, and plums. Excess inflammation in the body has been linked to depression.
 - Maintain optimal blood levels of vitamin D via safe sun exposure, consuming vitamin D-rich foods (oily fish, fortified dairy products, mushrooms, eggs) and appropriate use of vitamin D supplements.
 - Include magnesium-rich foods in your diet regularly – green vegetables, nuts, seeds, beans, whole grains, and wheat germ.
 - Increase your intake of tryptophan-rich foods. Foods high in tryptophan include: turkey, whole soy foods, lean meats, fish, and low-fat dairy products.
 - Include folate-rich foods in your diet regularly. Green vegetables, beans, peas, lentils, wheat germ, any form of tomato product, oranges, nuts, seeds, whole soy foods, parsley, and beets are excellent sources.
 - Include vitamin B-12 rich foods in your diet regularly. The healthiest sources would be low-fat dairy products, fish, and shellfish. If you are older than 50, get your level checked periodically. Some people need to take supplements.
 - Avoid sugary beverages and artificially sweetened (diet) sodas.
 - Use anti-inflammatory herbs and spices regularly in your foods – turmeric, curry, ginger, and rosemary are especially potent.
 - Spend time in nature regularly. Daily best.
 - Maintain positive relationships with family and friends.
 - Engage in relaxation practices regularly – deep breathing, yoga, meditation, etc.
 - Cultivate and nurture your spirituality, especially via practices that focus on love and forgiveness.
 - Give of yourself and your money to help those in need.
- Get optimal sleep - approximately 7-8 hours per night.

Remember, Blood Pressure Checks will be Sunday, November 1st in the Narthex. They may be lower with that extra hour of sleep! Don't forget to change the clock Saturday night.

Mom said the oldest daughter's favorite thing to play was wrapping up in her green blanket and becoming a cocoon then she breaks out of her cocoon and becomes a butterfly, flying around the house.

If a three-year-old can understand the purpose of the garden, I think our work was worth it.
