Update on Jenny Skridulis Velon - So far, Jenny has persevered through 16 weekly or bi-weekly chemo events, which ended in September. A rest/recover pause followed. Her mastectomy took place on November 21st. Jenny managed the post-op fatigue, aches, discomfort, etc. quite well. She is now prepping for the next treatment step, which is five weeks of daily radiation therapy. The radiation treatment begins next week (Monday, January 20th). Through it all, Jenny has been admirably stoic and resilient. And, to this point, indications are that the treatment program is "working". But it's not done yet, and we have sadly learned by experience that unpleasant surprises can still occur. Which means, continuing support from the "powerful prayers" would be most welcome. Southern California Wildfires: PDA Response Southern California is facing multiple uncontrolled fires, exacerbated by strong winds and dry conditions. Tens of thousands of residents have been forced to evacuate and more than 57,000 homes are threatened.

PDA is in communication with the affected presbyteries to offer resources in the aftermath of the fires. So far, we are aware of one Presbyterian church destroyed (Pacific Palisades Presbyterian Church) and several more are threatened. We will know more once the fires are contained, and evacuation orders have been lifted. We pray for all lives affected, for swift containment and the safety of first responders.

January 19: Mapping our Natural Heritage: A Geographer's Perspective on the Rare Plants, Animals, and Ecosystems of Kansas

Presenter: Jennifer Delisle, Ph.D., Associate Researcher, Kansas Biological Survey & Center for Ecological Research

Description: Stewardship of our natural world begins with knowing what is here and precisely where it is found. The Kansas Natural Heritage Inventory has been compiling information about the status and location of the state's most threatened species and ecosystems for nearly 40 years. I'll illustrate some of the state's lesser-known rare species and show how maps of biodiversity data are being used for conservation work at the local, state, and national levels.

January 26: Opportunities and Challenges for Monarch Conservation


Presenter: Kristen Baum, Director of Monarch Watch: Kristen is Senior Scientist with the Kansas Biological Survey and Professor in the Department of Ecology and Evolutionary Biology at the University of Kansas. Baum has worked with pollinators for more than thirty years. She has served on numerous state, regional, national, and international working groups to support monarch and pollinator conservation efforts.

Description: Monarch butterflies have exhibited substantial population declines in recent years. The US Fish and Wildlife Service has proposed listing the monarch as threatened with a 4(d) rule under the Endangered Species Act. Learn about the status of monarchs, factors that have contributed to the decline, details about the USFWS proposal, and ways to support monarch conservation.

February 2: Gardening to Support Insects: Native Plants Matter, But Don't Rip Out Your Peonies Presenter: Sharon Ashworth, Ph.D., serves as the Horticulture and Natural Resources Agent for Douglas County. Her work with Extension began as a volunteer with the Extension Master Gardeners after transitioning from academia to a book, "Wading Right In - Discovering the Nature of Wetlands" (2019)

Description: Whether it's diagnosing plant problems, recommending suitable plants for landscapes, or advising on rural acreage care—from ponds to prairies— Sharon applies scientific knowledge to help people create sustainable and beautiful landscapes.



Legislative Priorities for the 2025 Kansas Legislature

The legislature was gaveled back into session on Monday. It promises to be a very active session. Kansas Interfaith Action (KIFA) represents the views of persons of faith across Kansas on how to best care for our neighbors. As many members of our congregation actively devote time and resources to support KIFA's efforts, we thought the congregation would be interested in their legislative priorities for the 2025 session as stated on their website. The list also provides a snapshot of some of the legislation that may be introduced during the session. For an in-depth description go to: https://kansasinterfaithaction.org/

- Full funding of public education
- Opposition to book bans and limitations on the teaching of history or literature
- Support for affordable housing to reduce homelessness
- Medicaid expansion to protect rural hospitals
- Expand access to school meals the only predictable daily meal for many children
- Protect the graduated income tax and target property tax relief to working and middle-income families
- Roll back the most punishing aspects of the "HOPE" act that limits SNAP (food assistance) to some Kansans fighting drug addiction
- Reject any further discriminatory legislation targeting our LGBTQ+ citizens
- Support development of a comprehensive state energy plan and a fully staffed state energy office
- Oppose attempts to preempt local authorities' efforts to address pollution from single-use plastics
- Oppose restriction of voting rights by limiting access and imposing time restrictions
- Oppose dehumanizing rhetoric, mass deportations, militarization of our borders, and asylum restrictions
- Oppose efforts to expand religious or philosophical objections to childhood immunizations
